North County artists join in SITE 97

ublic art goes big time and big scale in inSITE97, 40-plus installations spread out around San Diego and Tijuana. And North County is part of the action: Deborah Small, Bill Bradbury, Dana Case and Patricia Mendenhall collaborated on the multimedia piece "Rowing in Eden."

The four Cal State San Marcos teachers have grown a window garden in San Diego's Santa Fe Depot. The other major display in the public art exhibition is dried sprays of

more than 500 wildflowers hanging from the ceiling. A pantry full of canned fruits and vegetables com-

pletes the natural setting.
Small, who conceived the idea and wrote the master script, said, "We concentrated on plants because 80 percent of the world's population believes in herbal remedies.

"Our display is actually focused more narrowly. We explore the histor-

ical relationship of women and plants, on the herbalists, healers, diviners and wise women who became known as 'witches.' Not so much on the persecution of witches and midwives, but on the powers attributed to them as well as their own sense of pow-

The plants, fruits and garden are not the complete project. The entire process, from conception to completion, has been taped to show as an interactive computer-generated piece incorporating still images, text, music and video.

Small indicated a corner of the room screened in black drapes. "Bill Bradbury composed the music. Dana Case narrates the text that I wrote and compiled. In (the poem) 'Mother of All Living Things,' she speaks as Eve in the Garden of Eden and as Rebecca Lemp, a Swabian woman accused of witchcraft and burned to death in 1590."

Small also wrote the poem she attributes to Katherine Kepler, accused and acquitted of witchcraft in 1615. Other sources are formulas for ointments that supposedly en abled witches to fly by French physician Jean de Nynauld, Bavarian J. Hartiliepp and the Swiss alchemist, Paracel-

Small said, "Rowing in Eden" (the title comes from a poem by Emily Dickinson) also shows how the natural and the technical interact. "Several medications in use today are from plants that have been used for centuries. And scientists are scouring jungles around the world in hopes of finding others.

'Atropine that's used in treating diseases of the eye comes from belladonna that was the main ingredient in flying ointments. Foxglove, laurel, fennel, goldenrod, even stinging nettles also have medicinal qualities.'

Small talked as she worked: tying clusters of leaves and flower sprays for hanging; nailing a rattlesnake skin to a post; rearranging pieces that were already hung for better color and textural effects.

"We are almost overwhelmed with materials. I live in Rainbow, where there's a good supply of plants. And since people heard about the project, they've been bringing us more. We have to choose before we cut and

A crew of three — Terrilynn, an Escondido artist; Carole Kuck; and Rebecca Sininou - helped Small with the installation. "We'll have a different crew every day," she said. "Some are students from my 'Process of Art' class, who are interested in the project as a hands-on experiment, and others are simply interested in what we are do-

ing here.
"We are also involved in the 'Drawing Down the Moon' ceremony at Oceanside Harbor Beach," she said. "That's close to Halloween, a more appropriate time for dealing with witches' activities."

Until then, visitors to "Rowing in Eden" can enjoy rose hips, cattails, mugwort, eucalyptus, bougainvillea and assorted herbs and plants as natural art.


