

PUBLIC LECTURES

The project will intersect with the public through a series of lectures about space and how it is defined as locked or unlocked. These will be illustrated lectures. At the end of each lecture there will be an opportunity to exchange keys. The lectures will take place in a variety of venues, schools, corporations, clubs, universities, and cultural centers, and will be inspirational/motivational in tone. The lectures will interweave three themes:

THEME 1

The first theme is discussion and a series of images that explore space and the devices we use to lock and unlock them. The spaces discussed will cover a range from the smallest scale to the largest: the bed side drawer, the closet, the room, the house, the neighborhood, the country, the planet. The photos will include all the sorts of "keys" that open up space: swipe cards, PINs, passports, physiognomy, language, ID cards, regular keys, and space rockets.



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THEME 2

Another theme consists of a series of images that together create an expanded portrait of both cities. It begins with a photo of an individual. It continues with a photo of that person's key chain in the palm of their hand. It ends with an individual portrait of each key paired and the space it unlocks. Six such portraits will be produced. Three from Tijuana, and three from San Diego. Each set of three will try to map out the cities by choosing a diverse set of people.

PUBLIC LECTURES THEME 3

Part of the project entails the making of the "Key to the Cities". While most keys to the city are purely symbolic, this key will step down from the symbolic and be as actual as possible.

Several door locks, padlocks, and other types of locks around both cities will be changed for locks that can be opened with a single master key. The locks that are changed will lay out a taxonomy of the city that will create a portrait of the cities. These spaces, the people associated with those spaces, and the process of exchanging the locks will be documented to create the third theme of the lectures.





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EXCHANGE/SWAP

Each public lecture ends with an overture towards the audience. A key duplicating machine will be available, and everyone will be invited to get a new key in exchange for allowing a duplicate of one of their keys -to be made on the spot

Exchange of keys: barter one key for another One possible exchange occurs when attendants to the lecture allows for one of their keys to be copied in exchange for someone else's key. The exchange is intimate but anonymous.

Venues Once again, another taxonomy takes effect: fourteen venues, seven in each city, each representing a diversity of audiences. Possible venues can be, but are not limited to: museum groups, high schools, universities, art schools, kinder gardens, elementary schools, offices, factories, government agencies, open lecture halls, etc.



KEY TO THE CITIES

The 'key to the cities' is a key that literally opens spaces around both cities. There will be a critical mass of emblematic sites around both cities to convey the sense that his is the key to the cities. Ideally, each site will have a counterpart across the border. While most keys to the city are purely symbolic, this key will step down from the symbolic and be as actual as possible.

Door locks, padlocks, and other types of locks around both cities will be changed for locks that can be opened with a single master key. The locks that are changed will lay out a taxonomy of the city that will create a portrait of the cities.
