

ange — didn't match anything.

But Eloisa Haudenschild was at least easy to spot in the crowd that jammed the space called 4th & B. Saturday night for a celebration that launched the binational art event called inSite97.



Eloisa and her astonishing wig — which she removed after a bit — co-chaired the party with La Jolla's Heather Metcalf and Tijuana's Rosella Fimbres.

The lively art auction and dinner-dance netted \$125,000 for inSite — a collaborative project undertaken by the United States and Mexico. One of its components is a major exhibition of public art, coming up in September.

That's when 43 installations created by artists from

11 countries will go on display — here, there and everywhere in San Diego and Tijuana.

— including Robert Therrien's gigantic table and

The party's auction of 22 works by established artists — Christo, Sol LeWitt, Manny Farber, John Baldessari and the like — contributed mightily to the impressive net.

Top auction bids were commanded by Vito Acconci's untitled ink-on-paper (\$24,000) and an untitled charcoal by Joel Shapiro (\$13,500).
