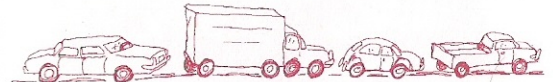

through a city?

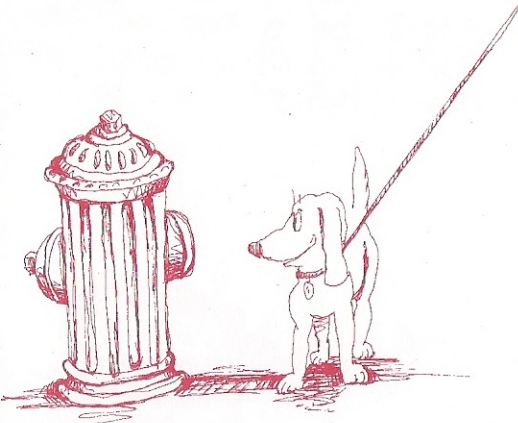
Tall buildings, small buildings
houses, and stores.



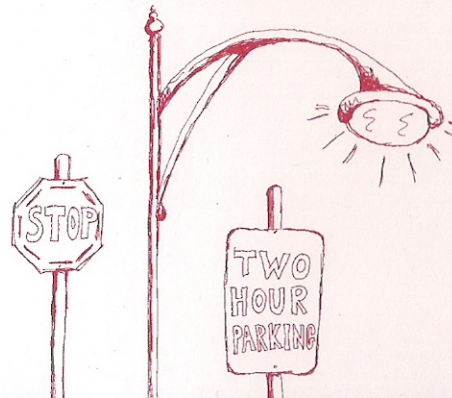
Cars and trucks,

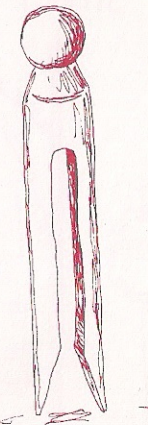


miniCITY is a miniature city in which everything is made out of stuff like cardboard, bottle caps, clothespins, corks, and cloth scraps.

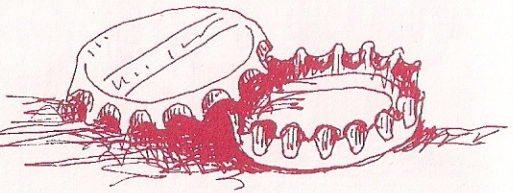
For instance, a cardboard box could be a house or a store or any sort of building.



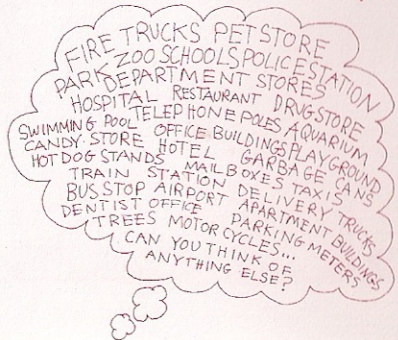
A clothespin could be a person.
